"Active" service is when you directly create positive social change because of your actions. Specific examples include facilitating the interactions with nonprofits to plan and execute an event, set-up and breakdown at events, collecting food donations.

There is a difference between logging hours within class activities and active service in the community! One is a grade, the other is a program requirement. Not both - unless your syllabus specifies. Hours for class credit should be "active," not "passive."

The service form is your friend! Be as specific and descriptive as possible in all sections.

Remember to check with your syllabus to see if you need to get service hours in a specific category - going to multiple locations is okay!

Attending philanthropic events is not service. Fundraising by solely financial donations is not service. However, make it service by planning the events and/or raising awareness while doing so.
